

The depiction of **FLORA & FAUNA SPECIES** within the **GREEN CAULDRON PANORAMA** is 'work-in-progress'

The objective is to portray the following:

- all 20 species of diurnal birds of prey (in flight) recorded in the region.
- at least 15 plant species likely to be seen on or near the summit.
- at least 18 species of insects (including butterflies) likely to be associated with these plants.
